Leo BeierBuilder

In the 1960s, Leo Beier, a lifelong soccer player, became head referee for the District Juvenile Soccer Association, and later served as President. He coached all ages, and would continue imparting his love for the game to everyone throughout his career.

Leo was instrumental in bringing Women's soccer to Vancouver Island and would go on to develop top-rated teams such as the 1981 Nanaimo Tigers, whom he coached for 17 years, and the 1993 VIU

Mariners Women's Team, who still hold the national record. Leo also co-founded a Youth Indoor Futsal program (indoor soccer) in 1980, and continued to support the program as an event organizer and coach over the years.

In 1992 he was made an honorary lifetime member of the Nanaimo and District Youth Soccer Association and in 2001 he was awarded the BCSA Award of Merit for his contributions to the sport.

Leo has coached hundreds of players - some going on to play professionally at high levels, and many others who went on to share their talents as players and coaches locally. He was known to be a passionate, hardworking, and respected soccer coach and his contributions to sport in Nanaimo are significant.



Sandy Harper Athlete - Golf

Sandy Harper grew up in a family of golfers, and started playing when he was just seven years old. At the age of twelve, he became a junior member of the Nanaimo Golf and Country Club, and began competing at the Junior level in Island & Provincial tournaments. He then competed at the Men's Amateur level until he became a professional and went on to win the 1984 BC Open. Sandy played professionally both nationally and internationally, with tours across Canada, Australia and Asia throughout his career. In the early 2000s, Sandy

returned to Nanaimo to focus on his family, and later regained his amateur status. By the mid-2000s he was competing in the Mid-Amateur, Mid-Masters, and Seniors divisions of BC tournaments. Between 2006 and 2012 he competed consistently and won many accolades. Sandy was inducted into the BC Golf Hall of Fame in Vancouver in 2013, and was the only player to win all British Columbia Major Championships at both Amateur and Professional Levels.

In 2020 he suffered a stroke and has worked hard to get back to the game he loves. Upon his remarkable return, he won the BCGA Senior and Super Senior Amateur Championships.



Robert (Bob) Gold Builder

Bob Gold was born to a Nanaimo family already well known for their involvement in local sports and community. Growing up he played many sports, and early on he started coaching and helping with field construction and maintenance. Bob started coaching in the 1970s and was known for being a good teacher who emphasized teamwork. During the 1980s and 90s he was President of Nanaimo Minor Baseball and as an

umpire himself, he founded the Nanaimo Umpires Association to develop young umpires. In the early '90s, Bob introduced the 'Fair Play' code to Nanaimo Minor Baseball in order to keep things fair and equal for all players. He made national headlines in 2001 for work addressing harassment of young hockey officials, which helped to develop rules of conduct for not just players, but also parents and coaches. Bob loved giving back to the community and was involved in every aspect of sport, stepping in to coach, organize, fundraise, build, rally or promote wherever the need was greatest. His work gained him many certificates of merit and appreciation, including local, provincial and national accolades. Bob joins his father, Jim Gold, in the Nanaimo Sports Hall of Fame.



Lauren van Oosten

Athlete – Swimmer (2004 Olympian)

Born in Nanaimo, Lauren van Oosten was a member of the Nanaimo Riptides swim team and started competitive swimming in 1988. In 1997 she won bronze at the Pan Pacific Championship in Fukuoka, Japan, her first international competition. By 1998 she became a member of the University of Calgary swim team, the Canadian National Swim Team, and was named the Canadian Swimmer of the Year. Lauren became a team member of the 1999 Pan Pacific Championship. In 2003 she

joined the World Championship team and broke a 10-year-old national record in the women's 200 m breaststroke event. Two months later she broke the Canadian record at the World Cup event in New York. After a few tough years, Lauren fought her way back and joined the Canadian Olympic team in 2004 in Athens. She was elected by her peers as the women's team captain for both the Olympics and the 2006 Commonwealth Games in Melbourne. In 2008 Lauren swam with the Zwemclub Amersfoort in the Netherlands, and retired later that year. In 2009, Lauren was inducted into the BC Swimming Hall of Fame as a 14-time National Champion and former Canadian record holder.
